News: "The 'new' Justitia and reimagining justice."

Old vs New Justitia:

Old Justitia:

- · Introduced by British.
- Blindfolded: symbolised equality before the law and impartiality.
- · Sword: symbolised punishment and authority.
- Scales: representing fairness and weighing of evidence impartially.

New Justitia:

- Blindfolded removed: symbolise "the law is not blind; it sees everyone equally."
- Sword replaced with Constitution of India: represents a justice system that is no longer focused on punishment but rather on ensuring fairness and equality based on constitutional principles.
- Scales: representing balance in society, fairness, and weighing of evidence impartially.

Why Redesign:

 Efforts to move away from British-era traditions in Indian law. Similar to recent overhaul of colonialera laws such as Indian Penal Code 1860 with Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) 2024.

News: "Growing epidemic."

About Diabetes:

- Type 1: Insulin-Dependent Diabetes.
 - · Usually develops in children and young adults.
 - Cause: Auto immune destruction (Immune system mistakenly attacks and destroys the insulin producing beta cells in the pancreas).
 - · Management: requires lifelong insulin therapy.
- Type 2: Non-Insulin-Dependent Diabetes.
 - Cause: body's ineffective use of insulin (insulin resistance) combined with relative insulin deficiency.
- More common in adults; associated with obesity, sedentary lifestyle.
- Management: Lifestyle modifications, oral medication etc.
- World Diabetes Day: Observed on 14th November each year.


About Insulin:

- · Hormone produced by the beta cells in the pancreas.
- · Function:
 - Regulates blood glucose levels by facilitating cellular uptake of glucose.
 - Promotes glucose storage as glycogen in the liver and muscles.
- Discovered in 1921 by Frederick Banting and C. Best;
 Nobel Prize awarded in 1923.
- HbA1c Test: Measures average blood glucose levels over the past 2-3 months.

India & Diabetes:

- India is known as the "Diabetes Capital of the World".
- National Programme for Prevention and Control of Diabetes etc under National Health Mission.
- 2030 WHO target for diabetes:
 - 80% of people with diabetes are diagnosed.
 - 80% of people with diagnosed diabetes have good control of glycaemia.

CODE OF CONDUCT

News: "Why were the Kerala IAS officers suspended?"

- Context: Kerala mulls action against IAS officer for social media group based on religion.
- Such acts contradict the foundational values of the civil service:
 - Impartiality and neutrality: Civil servants must act without bias or prejudice, treating all citizens equally.
 - **Integrity**: civil servants must avoid any actions that might discredit their position or the service.
 - All India Services (Conduct) Rules, 1968:
 Prohibits members from associating with organisations that promote discrimination or enmity between groups.
- · Such acts have impacts like:
 - Erosion of Public Trust.
 - · Undermining Social Harmony.

About AIS Rules 1968:

- Governs the conduct of IAS, IPS and Indian Forest Service officers.
 - Officers should maintain high standards of ethics, integrity, honesty, political neutrality, accountability and transparency.
 - Uphold the supremacy of constitutional values.
 - They can participate or contribute to public media in their official duties.
 - They *must not criticize the government's policies* in any public communication.
 - They can't seek court or press recourse for official acts criticized without government sanction
 - Officers shall do nothing that is 'unbecoming of a member of the service.'

HYPERSONIC CRUISE MISSILE

News: "India conducts 'historic' flight test of hypersonic missile with a range of 1,500 km."

While ancient India's arsenals boasted the formidable Brahmastra, today, we wield hypersonic cruise missiles—potent symbols of modern 'Shastra' that redefine battlefield dominance.


About Hypersonic Cruise Missile:

- · Cheetah of the skies, at speeds of at least Mach 5.
- Ranges greater than 1,500 km for all the services of the armed forces.
- · Powered by scramjets.
- Almost Impossible to Predict: Unlike ballistic missiles that follow the predictable curve, hypersonic cruise missiles change direction faster.
- Low-Level Flight: radar beams struggle to detect.
- Versatile payload options from conventional to nuclear payloads.
- · Missile has been indigenously developed by DRDO.
- Countries with Hypersonic Cruise Missiles: USA, Russia, China, North Korea, India.

Need for India:

- Shield against neighbours with swords drawn: i.e Pakistan and China.
- Tackling Chinese String of Pearls Strategy.
- Indigenous development: Unlike the dependency on imported equipment during the Kargil conflict.
- It can be programmed to hit multiple targets with uncanny precision.
- Pairing hypersonic missiles with India's existing fleet, like the Mirage 2000s and Sukhoi Su-30, can overwhelm layered defenses.
- Maritime Dominance: The Navy's integration of hypersonic cruise missiles ensures unchallenged control of India's maritime space.

ART. 19(1)(E): RIGHT TO SHELTER

News: "Two cheers for the top court's 'bulldozer' judgment".

Art. 19(1)(e): Right to Shelter:

Context: Supreme Court questions the legality of recent house demolitions of accused portrayed as action against Anti-Social Elements in UP, MP, HR, and Delhi.

SC held:

- Such actions contradict fundamental right the Art. 19(1)(e): Right to shelter of the accused family.
- Justice to be dispensed according to law and by due-process. But not using Bulldozer.
- Destroying family homes, leaving entire families homeless, was nothing short of "anarchy".
- The Principle of 'separation of powers' gave the courts the power to decide if someone was guilty or not, not the State.
- Before demolishing a home, the State must serve notice and provide 15 days for reply. A personal hearing is held, and even after the demolition order is final, the affected person has a 15-day appeal right.

Note: SC invoked **extraordinary powers under Art.142** to issue directions related to the case.

News: " tragic incident of the hospital fire in Jhansi district, Uttar Pradesh".

Case Study Point of View:

- · Public outrage is mounting due to:
 - Negligence in Safety Protocols in Intensive Care Units.
 - Criticism over misallocation of funds: public funds being allocated to building places of worship.
 - Lack of Accountability: There is a perception that state-appointed inquiry committees often fail to reveal the truth, leading to distrust among the public.

Challenges as a District Magistrate:

- Ensuring the hospital's security to prevent any violence and maintain uninterrupted health services.
- Ensuring a Transparent Investigation.
- Restoring Public Trust: that government's ability to provide safe healthcare.
- Addressing Resource Allocation Concerns: better allocation of funds towards essential services.
- Urgent implementing Safety Measures: in all hospitals in the district adhere to safety protocols to prevent future incidents.

Ethical principles and values involved:

- · Responsibility and Accountability:
 - As a public servant, the DM ensures public institutions operate safely and effectively by holding individuals and organizations accountable for negligence.
- · Transparency and Integrity:
 - Transparent investigations and decision-making processes reflect a commitment to integrity.
 - Open communication and honesty are crucial in maintaining public trust.
- · Justice and Fairness:
 - The affected families deserve justice, and the broader community deserves fair allocation of resources that prioritize essential services over less critical expenditures.
- Compassion and Empathy:
 - Recognizing victims' suffering and their families' pain is crucial. Policies and actions should reflect empathy and a commitment to alleviating their suffering.
- · Public Interest:
 - Decisions should be made with the public interest at heart, prioritizing safety, health, and well-being.
